Mayor's Message

I would like to remind everyone that parking a licensed vehicle, such as a car or pickup, on a city street right-of-way is allowable provided it is not stored there. If you do park along a city right-of-way, please be sure to stay clear of sidewalks so that you are not obstructing pedestrian traffic (which includes electronic wheel chairs and scooters). If you park in an alley, you must park on private property as alleys are not wide enough to allow parking on the city right-of-way.

The City will be doing another Citywide Clean-Up Day in April. This is a good time to start thinking about sorting through stuff that you want to get rid of. We should be able to take things like old furniture, clothing, empty and dried paint cans, appliances (large and small), metal, tires, computers, TVs, etc. We won't take normal household garbage or things that can be recycled, such as magazines, newspapers, glass jars, milk jugs, or cardboard. The brush pile will be open for yard debris.



New Library

The library Request for Proposal (RFP) notice for an Architect/Engineer was published on February 10th and RFPs are due by March 18th.

The Architect/Engineer will be responsible for completing the final project design which will include a schematic design of the building along with land-scaping and parking.

A committee to review the RFPs will meet on Thursday, March 21st. RFPs will be scored on experience, history of working on community facilities in small communities, available resources and staff, and references. The committee will make a recommendation to the City Council to award a contract at the following Council meeting on April 1st.



Wastewater Project

Once again, we must remind everyone that the sewer system is NOT a garbage disposal. A big part of the problem we are having at the lagoons is due to a high volume of solid matter that is not properly breaking down.

Even though some things, like vegetables, paper towels or wipes, are biodegradable, they do not breakdown in a timely manner so they create more solid build up in the sewer pond. Since these things do not decompose at a rapid rate, they create what is known as "suspended solids", or particles that are waterborne that exceed 2 microns in size.

The DEQ sets limits to the total number of suspended solids (TSS) allowed under the City's wastewater discharge permit. There are also limits on things like BOD (biochemical oxygen demand), ammonia, pH, E.coli, alkanity, and nitrate, just to name a few. When solids don't break down properly, it can, and often does, cause these components to exceed the limits set in the discharge permit. Over the course of many years, the build up of solids has caused numerous problems which have led to fines and a mandate from the DEQ that the City must dredge the lagoons by September 2024. The estimated cost of the project is about \$850,000. Because there are not a lot of grants available for this kind of project, the City must take out a loan to cover the bulk of the expense, which requires a substantial increase in sewer rates by the end of the project.

It is generally recommended to dredge sewer ponds every 20 years or so, depending on the amount of bio-solids buildup. The last time the City ponds were dredged was September of 1998, 26 years ago.

So, keep in mind, every time you flush something other than human waste, it contributes to the problem.

History of Water System

In 1906, at a regular election held in North Powder, the City Council was given authority to spend public funds to construct a ditch and divert water for public use. In 1908, Ordinance #24, was passed to create a water commissioner to be in charge of distributing water for irrigation and domestic use. A penalty of \$5 to \$50 was set for the unlawful use of the water. The idea of laying pipe to distribute water was introduced in 1913.

In October 1919, the City held an election and approved issuing bonds in the sum of \$30,000 to pay the cost of constructing, maintaining and operating a waterworks system. Thirty bonds were to be sold in the amount of \$1000 each. They would mature in 20 years with a 6% per annum interest rate.

In April 1921, another bond issue was put to a vote, for \$7500, to "make additions, extensions and betterments to the City water system."

By June 1921 the water system was finally completed and water rates were set at \$1.50 per month for each residence, bare lot for sprinkling, office building, drug store, grocery store, pool hall, warehouse, opera house, & the M&M Co. Restaurants and barber shops were to pay \$3per month, hotels and garages, \$5 per month, and school building and grounds paid \$10 per month.

The total cost of the system, including a pump station, water lines and water tower, came to approximately \$37,500. Construction of the pump house was another \$695.
